Robinson, Equiticity, the National Association of Development Organizations, Project for Public Spaces, Rails-to-Trails Conservancy, and the Rural Community Assistance Partnership – will support equitable rural and Tribal commercial district development anchored with transformative transportation projects and help downtowns in rural and Tribal areas develop an awareness of Federal opportunities, prepare community leaders to implement infrastructure and community development projects, and build lasting local capacity for carrying out projects. The Capacity Building team will provide subgrants to each community over the two-year period of support.
